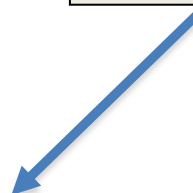

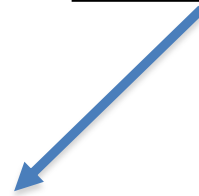
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## Abstract

This is the abstract page, which should be written in English. The indent for each paragraph should include 4–5 spaces, unlike in Japanese (where you use only one space for indentation).


Abstract is supposed to summarize the whole thesis. You first start with stating the topic and the research question addressed in the thesis.

Then you move on to introduce the organization of the thesis. Abstract should consist of about 400-450 words (=about one page in this format).

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## Chapter 1 Introduction

When you write in English, the indent of the first line of the paragraph should contain at least four spaces. Set the font to Times New Roman, 12 point, and the number of lines per page to 22 lines. This document is set to this required style, and you can use this. Justification is optional. Abstract is not required.

Do not forget to always begin a new page for each chapter. See the Japanese version of the style sheet for some tips, *dos* and *don'ts*.

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
